SAPO IN WONDERLAND

s it scales back its staff, shuts premises and closes down its own courier company – Courier Freight Group this year – the South African Post Office has devised a brilliant new strategy.

It wants the Independent Communications Agency of South Africa (ICASA) to fine couriers and give it the money. Only in South Africa or Wonderland could an idea like this be floated.

This from an organisation which received R10.5 billion in taxpayer bailouts, subsidies and business rescue injections since 2014. How much more do they need?


Instead of exercising strategic foresight to anticipate a global trend; instead of reacting while business and commerce, agriculture, government and the public voted with their feet; instead of meeting its targets; instead of focusing on its primary business; while cutting its own capability to the bone, SAPO has found a simpler solution. It asks ICASA to loot the Express Logistics industry on its behalf. A move to make Dick Turpin proud.

The whole sorry story is laid out in the SAPO Annual Report for 2025. "Reengineering South Africa's designated postal operator". This is a 219 pages blockbuster. If you haven't read it already, you're in for a treat.

"Since entering business rescue on 10 July 2023, S A Post Office has undergone a bold transformation." You bet it was bold. The branch network was reduced to 657 sites, 28 of which are not operational due to historical landlord issues.

"The Post Office's 2024/2025 annual report revealed that it has reduced its headcount from 10,854 to 5,946 as part of its ongoing business rescue proceedings. The figure is down 74% from the 22,575 staff the postal agency had in 2014.

These thousands of retrenchments stand in stark contrast to the situation in the express logistics industry which was creating new jobs and educating thousands of young South Africans for meaningful employment.



How did this hatchet-wielding affect the SAPO performance?

SAPO managed just 3.3 million parcel deliveries in 2024, down from 17.6 million in 2023. It missed the ICASA-mandated 92% mail delivery performance with an actual 62.13%. But don't worry as "plans are underway to maintain the momentum to fully achieve the regulated delivery standard of 92%" This from an organisation which hasn't met its minimum delivery standard in over a decade.

The Post Office courier target of 92% was underachieved with a performance of 69%. Incidentally, the Auditor General estimated the actual achievement to be materially less than reported.

Sad to say, the costs of combating SAPO's demands to sequestrate revenue from our members and our industry are significant. The outcome is a reduction in funds that could be re-employed productively in creating jobs, sustaining service excellence and increasing industry education and skills in association with Transport Education Training Authority, TETA and an array of education service providers.

So, given all the facts, where do you stand on SAPO's latest demand?

The boot on the other foot

The Minister for Communication, Digital Technologies and Innovation, Solly Mahlatsi, says SAPO is seeking strategic private-sector partners as it prepares imminently to exit business rescue according to Business Report.

The government has issued a Request for Information (RFI) to the private sector for potential partnerships in courier and postal services, as well as for leasing its infrastructure. This approach is driven by the need for private investment and expertise.

As part of the business rescue plan, SAPO underwent significant restructuring, including closing hundreds of branches and a large-scale employee retrenchment process, to place the entity on a more sustainable path.

Black Friday then Christmas



lack Friday is next and we are already swamped with Christmas decorations and carols as our industry prepares for the sudden upsurge in all kinds of shipments.

We have just put behind us the last event - Halloween with its emphasis on "scary stories". Now, I am not a huge fan of Horror, but I do enjoy entertainment that is a little gothic in nature such as "The Addams Family", "Wednesday", "Beetlejuice", "The Sandman" which border more on the fantasy side.

These stories, along with a recent advertising campaign that I have seen on a social media platform by The Courier Guy prompted me to think about the "Scary Stories" that crop up in Express logistics.

- Human remains showing strange pieces of metal on X-Ray images (turns out it was just an underwire from a bra)
- Discovering undeclared containerized live baby snakes in parcels
- Clients dropping off boxes labelled with explosive hazard labels, (though in fact the box contained food)
- Blood dripping from a flyer bag (a client had sent frozen meat which was defrosting en route)

Occasions like these ensure there is never a dull moment in our industry. Every day is an adventure, especially since clients now take advantage of the myriad easy-to-use ways we have given them to send goods around the country!

That's why we need a re-think how to educate our clientele about what they can and cannot send through these different channels. This is very different from a personal handover with questions and body language. So, we also need to determine what checks and balances we can put in place to prevent real "Scary Stories" from happening. We need to be prepared for any

Our goal remains to turn all client occasions into stories of great customer service in a safe and secure environment. This is where training is critical, so our people recognise signs to look out for to identify hidden or misdeclared Dangerous Goods: hazard labels or Globally Harmonised Symbols (GHS pictograms) or indications that the contents are flammable or if something is very cold to the touch possibly dry ice. For parcels that might contain animals, looking out for the tell-tale "breathing holes" or respond if there is movement within the box.

For those employees who deal directly with the public, training is essential on the type of guestions to ask. Openended questions are generally a good idea - What, Who, Where, When, How and Why get to the truth of what is being sent. Even though we know (as Dr Gregory House MD puts it "Everyone lies") we need to treat senders with respect and work with them to understand exactly what it is they are sending.

The challenges of peak season await us. Keep your quard up - quide your clients on safe and secure shipments and let's get ready for the year-end celebrations.



THE MYSTERY COURIER **Porch Pirates Premiership** he boom in FRAGILE e-commerce home deliveries

has spawned a new breed of criminal:

Porch Pirates. These are opportunistic thieves who nick parcels dropped off by couriers at people's homes while they are out.

New UK research by technology company Quadient found that nearly 5 million households had been hit by at least one parcel theft in the last year.

When News Delivery reported on the issue two years ago, Hertfordshire topped the log with over 70 thefts per 100,000 population.

Now the county has dropped to second place with Leicestershire taking pole position.

Nationally, reported thefts increased from 11% of households

to 17% since 2023 with an average value per hoist of £138 - over R3100.00. It's estimated that only 1 theft in over 350 is actually reported to the police.

Leicestershire and Hertfordshire. You'd he excused for wondering where are the expected big hitters in the Porch Pirates Premiership?

The Metropolitan Police and Greater Manchester Police didn't respond.

he International Air Transport Association (IATA) has released updated 2026 editions of key industry manuals for cargo and ground operations, which incorporate close to 100 major changes and revisions to align with evolving global standards.

The main changes to the 2026 manuals include Dangerous Goods Regulations (DGR) and Battery Shipping Regulations (BSR)

The number of lithium batteries transported as cargo by air has surged 25% year-on-year.

"This year's IATA manuals updates reflect advancements in technology, digitalisation, regulation, and customer needs that are critical for safer, more efficient, and increasingly sustainable operations," Frederic


